About the GMR Foundation for Research and Education

Our Mission

The mission of the GMR Foundation for Research and Education is to support clinical, education and health-system research designed to improve patient care and safety in the out-of-hospital setting. The GMR Foundation supports research and educational activities focused on improving patient care, as well as projects that contribute directly or indirectly to the health and well-being of communities.

Our History

- **2012:** AMR was selected as one of nine partners in the HeartRescue Project, a multi-year initiative aimed at increasing the survival rate for victims of sudden cardiac arrest by 50 percent. The AMR Foundation for Research and Education's first action was to provide a platform for the HeartRescue Project.
- **2013:** The AMR Foundation adopted the annual golf tournament as its second project. Together, the HeartRescue Project and the golf tournament are the underpinnings for the GMR Foundation for Research and Education.
- **2018:** The AMR Foundation for Research and Education became a DBA of the GMR Foundation for Research and Education.

NAEMSP Annual Meeting Scholarships

Since 1984, the National Association of EMS Physicians ([NAEMSP](#)) Annual Meeting has served as a premier gathering for EMS professionals, providing a vital forum for sharing research, advancing clinical practice and building connections that drive the field forward.

The GMR Foundation awarded **\$35,000** in scholarship funding to support **60 EMS professionals** attending the Annual Meeting in Tampa, Florida, from January 26–31, 2026. This initiative reflects the Foundation’s commitment to promoting ongoing education and professional growth within the EMS community.

The scholarships were awarded to non-physician, non-student EMS professionals, regardless of their NAEMSP membership status, and covered registration, travel and lodging expenses. Recipients had the opportunity to enhance their clinical

knowledge, connect with leaders in the field and bring new insights back to their agencies, ultimately raising the standard of care for their communities.

Scholarship recipients described the experience as transformative, citing increased confidence, expanded professional networks and renewed passion for their work. The GMR Foundation remains dedicated to supporting the next generation of EMS leaders and ensuring continued excellence in emergency medical services.

NAEMSP EMS Fellowship Research Grant



The GMR Foundation awarded a **\$20,000** grant to **John Su, MD**, a National Association of EMS Physicians (**NAEMSP**) member to conduct pre-hospital care research as part of a NAEMSP EMS Fellowship Research project.

Dr. Su is attending Leland Stanford Junior University in Stanford, California and is using these funds for his NAEMSP research project: ***“Development and Validation of a Pediatric Pre-Hospital Transfusion Prediction Tool.”***

The grant supports research conducted by an EMS fellow in collaboration with an EMS faculty member. The committee reviews research proposals for significance, innovation, methodology, and ethical considerations involving human subjects. A subcommittee of the NAEMSP Research Committee evaluates all applications.

ESO/PCRF Research Forum Sponsorships

The GMR Foundation awarded **\$22,771** in research funding to advance continuing education and professional development opportunities for physicians and frontline providers through the **ESO/** UCLA Prehospital Care Research Forum (**PCRF**).

The three-day (May 7–9, 2025) immersive research forum workshop pairs dedicated participants with experienced clinical mentors, insightful methodologists and expert statisticians. Through collaborative discussions and hands-on guidance, this workshop aims to harness the power of data to enhance community health and safety.

Each group focused on a single research project. PCRF faculty collaborate with ESO to help participants obtain Institutional Review Board (IRB) approval for de-identified retrospective database review projects.

Onsite statisticians, programmers and editors provide immediate, step-by-step support, helping participants access data, perform statistical analyses, and prepare abstracts for submission or presentation.



Equipment Grant Improves Pediatric Patient Outcomes

Simulation manikins and advanced training equipment significantly elevate the quality of community CPR instruction and paramedic education. Realistic, hands-on practice not only increases training effectiveness but also provides greater confidence among participants. Ultimately, this leads to improved patient outcomes, heightened awareness of sudden cardiac arrest and empowers everyday people to respond effectively in emergencies.

The Glendale Community College EMS & Paramedic Training Program in Glendale, Arizona, received a

\$15,000 grant from the GMR Foundation to acquire specialized pediatric simulation manikins. With this funding, students gain access to realistic patient scenarios that help them refine critical skills and build confidence before serving in the field.

Equipment purchased through the grant includes:

- 1 nursing kid manikin
- 1 MegaCode kid
- 3 Neonate intubation heads
- 2 Cricoid stick trainers

Randy Strozyk, President

Randy Strozyk joined the Board in October 2018, bringing more than 45 years of experience in EMS operations and management. He served on the GMR leadership team for more than 25 years and retired in December 2024 as GMR's Senior Vice President of Executive Operations. Randy is currently serving as a senior advisor at GMR.

Strozyk earned his EMT/Paramedic certification and worked on an ambulance while studying microbiology at Washington State University. He has been heavily involved with the American Ambulance Association (AAA) for nearly two decades, serving as its past president in 2023–2024. Strozyk has a Bachelor of Science in Microbiology and a Master in Business Administration.



Edward Van Horne, Past President

Edward Van Horne has served on the Board since 2015. He is known throughout the industry for his innovative approach to EMS system design and his focus on clinical excellence. Van Horne is the President and Chief Operating Officer for GMR.

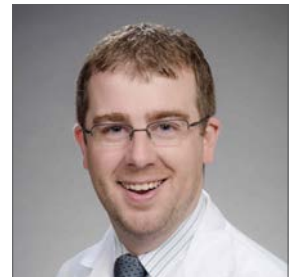


Andrew McCoy, MD, Board Member

Dr. Andrew McCoy is an Assistant Professor of Emergency Medicine and Program Director for the EMS Fellowship at the University of Washington. He completed medical school at the Cleveland Clinic Lerner College of Medicine at Case Western Reserve University and holds a Master's in Clinical Trials at Case Western Reserve University.

Dr. McCoy completed a residency in Emergency Medicine at the University of Buffalo in Buffalo, New York, where he served as Chief Resident during his final year. He then served as the inaugural EMS fellow at the University of Washington. He worked closely with the Seattle Fire Department, King County Medic One, King County EMS and Airlift Northwest.
